

## **2010 National Corn Yield Contest**

The National Corn Yield Contest (NCYC), the premier yield contest of every corn growing season, will celebrate 46 years of challenges, rewards and yields that were not even considered attainable a few years ago.

Last year will surely serve as an unforgettable contest year. Even in the midst of inclement weather affecting a majority of the states in some facet or another during their growing season; NCYC had yet another record breaking contest with a total of 6,958 entries. The top irrigated yield in the 2009 NCYC was 346 bushels per acre and the top non-irrigated yield was 319 bushels per acre. Will you be the one to have the highest yielding corn in the 2010 NCYC? National Corn Growers Association (NCGA) wants to challenge you to take advantage of this opportunity to explore new ideas and production techniques, while gleaned knowledge to enhance your future yield potential.

Winners will receive national recognition in the mid-February Farm Journal publication, the NCYC Corn Yield Guide and at the National Awards Banquet and State Awards Breakfast at the 2011 Commodity Classic in Tampa, Florida. As in the past contests, participating companies provide a variety of awards. Most important of all, you experience the challenge and satisfaction of learning production techniques that will enhance your corn yields.

Your participation also benefits all corn, as NCGA utilizes the wealth of information from the NCYC to study production trends. Your information is utilized by NCGA and other partners statistically demonstrate the production efficiencies of corn growers and your dedication to soil and nutrient conservation.

Please review the updated 2010 rules and guidelines for industry promotions (See Reverse Side). Any Grower participating in unapproved promotional activities are subject to disqualification.

The NCGA Corn Board requires the many industry partners promoting and supporting the National Corn Yield Contest follow the approved promotion and awards activities. It is the decision of the NCYC Committee that entrants and winners may benefit from promotional activities from multiple sources. Promotional activities should serve as a patronage benefit. The approved promotional activities state an individual company, manufacture and supplier may:

- Pay **entrants** NCGA National and Affiliate State annual dues.
- Pay **entrants** NCYC entry fees.
- Provide **entrants** with company products, in accordance with label rates, sufficient to cover the minimum contest plot of ten acres.
- Provide **national winners** cash or other awards totaling a maximum \$10,000. Lesser amounts may be awarded to **second and third place national winners**. Lesser amounts may be provided to **state winners**.
- Provide Commodity Classic travel expenses, lodging, meals and registration to **all 24 national winners and all first place state winners**. May include immediate family members, operation partners or other individuals with a stake in the NCYC plot.
- Provide **national and state winners** with company products, in accordance with label rates, sufficient to plant up to the minimum contest plot of ten acres.

The NCGA National Corn Yield Contest has been organized to encourage the development of sustainable new and innovative management practices and to show the importance of using sound cultural practices in United States corn production. Please read rules carefully. *All rules set forth herein apply to all Contest Classes alike.*

*CONTEST CLASSES (Cannot be changed at time of harvest).* Check one class only per entry. Please list only one hybrid per field per entry form. If there are questions on how a field should be classified, the entrant should contact the NCGA office in Chesterfield, MO.

- (A) The *A Non-Irrigated Class* is for corn producers entering a hybrid from all continental states of the United States, except for Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Minnesota, Missouri, Ohio, or Wisconsin. This class is for conventional and mulch-till tillage programs where soil is disturbed prior to planting.
- (B) The *AA Non-Irrigated Class* is for corn producers entering a hybrid located in Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Minnesota, Missouri, Ohio, or Wisconsin. This class is for conventional and mulch-till tillage programs where soil is disturbed prior to planting.
- (C) The *A No-Till/Strip Till Non-Irrigated Class* is for corn producers entering a hybrid from all continental states of the United States except for Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Minnesota, Missouri, Ohio, or Wisconsin. **No-Till:** A hybrid Entry is considered No-Till when the soil and residue cover is left undisturbed from harvest to planting. **Strip Till:** A hybrid Entry is considered Strip Till when a maximum of 1/3 of the row width is disturbed and may involve residue disturbance and or both. Planting or drilling is accomplished in a narrow seedbed or slot created by coulters, row cleaners, disk openers, in-row chisels or roto-tillers. Weed control is accomplished primarily with herbicides. Cultivation may only be used for emergency weed control. (Supplied by the Conservation Technology Information Center.)
- (D) The *AA No-Till/Strip Till Non-Irrigated Class* is for corn producers entering a hybrid located in Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Minnesota, Missouri, Ohio, or Wisconsin. A hybrid entry in this class must meet the same tillage requirements as prescribed above in the *A No-Till/Strip Till Non-Irrigated Class*.
- (E) The *No-Till/Strip Till Irrigated Class* is for corn producers in all continental states of the United States. A hybrid Entry in this class must meet the same tillage requirements as prescribed above in the *A No-Till/Strip Till Non-Irrigated Class*.
- (F) The *Ridge-Till Non-Irrigated Class* is for corn producers entering a hybrid from all continental states of the United States. A hybrid Entry is considered *Ridge-Till* where the soil is left undisturbed from harvest to planting except for strips up to 1/3 of the row width. Planting is completed in a seedbed prepared on ridges with sweeps, disk openers, coulters, or row cleaners. Residue is left on the surface between ridges. Weed control is accomplished with herbicides and/or cultivation. Ridges are rebuilt with cultivation. (Supplied by the Conservation Technology Information Center.)
- (H) The *Ridge-Till Irrigated Class* is for corn producers in all continental states of the United States. A hybrid Entry in this class must meet the same tillage requirements as prescribed above in the *A Ridge-Till Non-Irrigated Class*.
- (I) The *Irrigated Class* is open to corn producers in all continental states of the United States. Mechanical or man-made irrigation must be entered in an irrigated class. This class is for conventional and mulch-till tillage programs where soil is disturbed prior to planting.

1. *Be sure the proper class is indicated on the Entry Form and retain a copy for your information at time of harvest. The class cannot be changed at time of harvest. Check one class only per entry. Before harvesting check your entry confirmation to make sure all fields have been completed and are correct before harvesting. Please contact NCGA if there is a correction to your entry confirmation.*

2. *CONTEST ENTRANT QUALIFICATIONS:*

Entrant must hold a membership in the National Corn Growers Association and his/her State Association (where applicable): be a member in good standing with their state organizations, where applicable, participating in the state checkoff programs, where applicable, and supporting the NCGA and its policies. One membership applies for both associations. All entrants must have a current membership paid through March 1, 2011 to be listed in the yield contest results.

*The membership must be in the exact same name as on the Entry Form. EXAMPLE: Membership is in the name of Bob Taylor; name on Entry Form reads Taylor Farms or Taylor Brothers—a membership in each name would be required or the Entry will be changed to read Bob Taylor. Multiple entries from one person or farming operation should all be under the same membership name unless paying for additional memberships. Please include the membership number which is on the front of your form.*

More than one person in a family can enter, but each entry must have a separate membership and entry fee. The entrant can be either man or woman, but must be at least fourteen (14) years of age or older at the time of entry.

National Officers, National Directors, employees of the National Corn Growers Association, and members of NCGA Action Teams and Committees may not compete in the Contest.

If requested, the entrant agrees to provide records to NCGA of his methods of handling and preparing the land; cultivation and weed control methods; insecticides, fungicides, herbicides, fertilizers and rates of same that are used; the brand and variety of seed, seeding rate; date of planting, type and brand of corn planter, row width and date of harvesting; and if an irrigator, the time of irrigation, amount of each application and whether a sprinkler or flow-on system.

3. *CONTEST FIELD AND ENTRY QUALIFICATIONS:*

Contest entry must be *at least 10 continuous acres of one hybrid number*. Entry can be more than 10 acres if contestant desires. Contestant may select the best 10 acres in a corn field actually larger than 10 acres and enter this hybrid.

CONTINUOUS ACRES of one hybrid number is defined by the uniform width of the planter row spacing. The spacing of parallel corn rows may not be more than 120% of the planter row spacing and still qualify as "continuous". *Example: planter spacing is 30 inches then parallel corn rows may not exceed 36 inches ( $30 \times 1.20 = 36$ ).* In the interest of Best Management Practices, grass waterways and drainage ditches may be a part of the contest plot if at some point in the 10 acres the uniform planter row spacing is evident. The width of the grass waterway will be included in the harvested row length if corn rows are planted through the waterway. If the rows are planted along side the waterway or drainage ditch and row lengths vary, the actual length of each row must be included in the total row length.

The *originally entered hybrid number must be the same hybrid number that is reported on the Harvest Report Form*. The hybrid number entered must be currently commercially available for sale. Fields with inter-planted rows of a GMO hybrid number and corresponding non-GMO hybrid number do not qualify for entry. The field can be in contour or straight rows. The corn can be a hybrid of any color. The land entered in the Contest must be owned or leased by the entrant. The entrant agrees to harvest the Contest field as shelled corn with a multiple row harvester.

The entry can be anywhere in the continental United States. Any individual contestant may enter more than one hybrid number in each class. Each membership can win only one national and one state award. An entry fee of \$80 per hybrid if postmarked by July 1, 2010. After this date, \$110 per hybrid until August 2, 2010. The *Entry fee* in the form of your personal check or a valid seed company voucher (exceptions: voucher not required for DEKALB or Pioneer) must be received with the Entry Form or the form cannot be accepted. Also include your state membership dues if you are not a current member. These are shown on page 1. If your farm is on or near a state line and your hybrid entered is in one state but your mailing address is in another, you must indicate this when filling out the Harvest Form. The award will be given according to the state in which the hybrid is located.

*If the form is completed for you, be sure the class is correct.*

4. *SUPERVISOR ELIGIBILITY QUALIFICATIONS:*

The supervisor's names must be on the NCYC Entry form along with their title, address, telephone number and email address before the entry can be accepted. The supervisors are responsible for overseeing all computations and field measurements and must be present during harvesting, weighing, moisture testing and reporting the NCGA office as required by these rules. The entrant is responsible for mailing the information to the NCGA office.

*A supervisor or assistant cannot be related to the contestant, be a seed corn representative, chemical dealer or be an employee, employer, manager or consultant of the contestant or of his farm.*

6. *HARVEST REPORT FORMS:*

The contest entry must be harvested in accordance with the harvest procedures set forth by NCGA.

Harvest Report Forms are required to be completed and sent to the NCGA office postmarked no later than seven days after the final yield check is taken and no later than December 1, 2010, whichever date is earlier. Be sure to allow enough time in mailing your Harvest Report Form so that the seven-day deadline can be met.

Again, it is the responsibility of the entrants to see that their Harvest Report Forms are properly completed and mailed to the NCGA office by the deadlines previously stated.

7. *CONTEST AWARDS:*

Each membership is eligible to win only one national and one state trophy in the contest. If an entrant enters two or more hybrids and all place as a winner or runner-up, a trophy will be awarded only for the highest ranking hybrid. *Trophies will be awarded to first, second and third place National winners, and first, second and third place State winners in each of the contest classes.*

Awards will be presented at the 2011 Commodity Classic, in Tampa, Florida.
